Are you a passionate Environmental Science researcher eager to make a real impact with your work? Are you considering how to embed diversity, equity and inclusion in your research and public engagement? Do you want to enhance your leadership skills and engage with the public effectively? Are you responsible for supporting others with public engagement? Would you like to be a more effective leader of public engagement with research?

If so, our exclusive NERC Researcher Training Program in Inclusive Leadership and Public Engagement is tailor-made for you!

About the programme

At the heart of effective environmental research lies the need for researchers who can bridge the gap between science and society. Our comprehensive program is designed to empower NERC researchers like you with the skills and knowledge needed to excel in inclusive leadership for public engagement.

In the context of public engagement, we often think about DEI in terms of engaging audiences and working with participants; however, this programme seeks to incorporate aspects of inclusive leadership and building inclusive teams within this landscape.

Key highlights:

- Inclusivity in Public Engagement practice: Explore diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in the
 context of public engagement with research. Develop strategies and practical methods to
 embed DEI in your practice.
- **Inclusive influence and leadership:** Develop your communication, collaboration, and decision-making skills to drive impactful research and public engagement initiatives.
- Creating an inclusive research culture: Learn the art of leading diverse teams and fostering an inclusive work environment.

The programme is delivered online across 12 weeks and will run from February 2024 to May 2024. There will be three main teaching blocks, plus an introductory workshop and a wrap-up workshop at the end of the programme. Each block will involve a two-hour participatory workshop, a one-hour





session with your mentor, and some self-directed time. We anticipate the entire programme will take around fourteen hours of contact time (e.g., workshops and mentoring) across the four-month period. We'd recommend allowing for an average of one and a half hours per week.

The programme is designed to accommodate your busy schedule. There will be ample opportunities to connect with fellow NERC researchers, guest speakers, and mentors who share your passion for environmental science and public engagement.

During the programme, you will have access to a specialist mentor. Our mentors bring a range of experience in strategic leadership of public engagement with research, including (i) developing and implementing a strategy; (ii) training researchers; (iii) participatory approaches; (iv) evaluation; and (v) DEI.

As part of the programme, you will also be invited to bring a live problem or project to work on. This will vary from person to person, but we invite you to consider specific challenges related to inclusive leadership that you will delve into during the training and share your progress and learning with your peers. For example, live problems or projects could vary from reviewing your approach to evaluation (embedding DEI), reflecting on how inclusive leadership of PER could inform your practice, through to developing a new funding proposal working with under-served audiences.

We hope to build a supportive network to boost your career and public engagement endeavours.

There will also be four 1-1 mentoring sessions to be arranged in and around the time of the workshops with your mentors.

The closing date for applications is the 14th of November, 2023. Applicants will be notified of their place on the programme no later than the 8th of December 2023. A total number of 20 places is available.





The places will be awarded based on the following criteria:

- Personal goals align with the aims of the programme.
- Availability for workshop dates.
- Geographic spread of participants and institutions.
- A breadth of experience regarding DEI.

Eligibility criteria

- Those participating in the training do not need to be working on NERC-funded research but should be aligned to NERC's science remit.
- You must be based at a UK research organisation eligible for NERC funding

David Owen (he/him), Independent Consultant
